Class Rules and Expectations:

- You must participate actively in small group and whole class discussions.
- You must consistently come to class prepared and turn in all work on time. Late work will be accepted for half credit one day
 past the due date, but no later. Turn in your work on time.
- You are responsible for promptly making up work you missed when you were absent. The student handbook states that students are allowed one day to make up work because of an excused absence.
